


Child Friendly Cities and Communities Programme

Child Friendly Cities & Communities is a Unicef UK programme that works with councils to put children's rights into practice. The programme aims to create cities and communities in the UK where all children – whether they are living in care, using a children's centre, or simply visiting their local library – have a meaningful say in, and truly benefit from, the local decisions, services and spaces that shape their lives.

The term 'child-friendly' is not just about baby-changing facilities or asking for children's views on play equipment – although both are important – but about a profound shift in how children are viewed and treated in a city or community.

Where we are now...



About the programme – foundational badges

We will work towards Child Friendly City status through six badges, three that are chosen by Unicef:

Communication

Across the city

- Information about children's rights is shared with children, young people and adults in different ways
- People know when important decisions affecting children, young people and families are being made

Co-operation & Leadership

Across the city

- People work together to make the city better for children and young people
- Decisions are made involving children and young people

Across the city

Culture

- People value and respect children and young people
- People know about and respect children's rights

About the programme – optional badges

A further three badges from a list of ten were selected by over 150 children and young people in Newcastle during the discovery phase October 2017 to June 2018.



Children and young people:

- Have good physical, mental and emotional health
- Are supported if they have any additional needs
- Know how to stay healthy

Equal & Included

All children and young people, regardless of their background, culture, ability or anything else

- Feel welcome in the city
- Have the same opportunities to grow, learn, explore and have fun
- Are protected from discrimination

Safe & Secure

Children and young people:

- •Feel safe in their homes, neighbourhood and across the city
- •Feel able to trust the police, teachers and other adults
- •Can share ideas about improving safety in the city and can speak out if they feel unsafe or worried

Action Plans

Each of the six badges will have an action plan with three outcomes developed with children and young people.

It is delivery of this action plan along with the views of children and young people that will determine whether we achieve Child Friendly City status.

Over the summer we went out to a number of events around the city to meet with children and young people. We talked about the badges and about what they thought should be included in the action plans.

Developing the Action Plans Action Planning Day 5th December 2018

Our Action Planning Day was hosted by Newcastle United Football Club at St James' Park.

We spent time in groups talking about outcomes (stars) that could be included in the plans and actions (balloons) needed to achieve those outcomes.

We then all voted for the actions we felt were most important to achieve the outcomes we wanted included in the action plans.

Public transport will be accessible to all children




Proposed actions to achieve this outcome	Votes
