

Co-ordinated Admissions Scheme for Newcastle upon Tyne maintained schools and academies 2027/28

Introduction

All local authorities are required by the School Admissions (Co-ordination of Admissions Arrangements) (England) Regulations 2012 to have a scheme in place each year for coordinating admission arrangements for all maintained schools and academies (except special schools and nursery schools) within their area. The scheme has to comply with the provisions of the [School Admissions Code 2021](#).

Co-ordination schemes are intended to simplify the admissions process whilst reducing the likelihood of any child being left without a school place. Co-ordination establishes a mechanism that ensures as far as is reasonably practicable, that every parent of a child living in a local authority (LA) who has applied to a state-funded school is sent a single offer of a school place by their home LA.

Co-ordination schemes do not affect the rights and duties of the governing bodies of voluntary-aided and foundation schools to set and apply their own admissions arrangements and oversubscription criteria, nor for academies to agree their own arrangements with the Secretary of State. Admission authorities do not need to determine the same or similar oversubscription criteria but must ensure that their own admission arrangements are compatible with and do not undermine the Co-ordination scheme for their area.

More information and advice is provided to parents through the Newcastle City Council website and leaflets which are made available to parents through childcare settings and schools in Newcastle. Specific advice can be obtained by contacting the School Admissions Team.

The following Co-ordinated Admission Scheme for Newcastle upon Tyne will apply to the admission arrangements for the school year beginning September 2027.

Overview of the admissions process

A common application form must be completed for each child who requires a school place, except those with an Education, Health and Care Plan (EHCP) for whom a school will be named through the EHCP review process.

Applications forms are available electronically through the Newcastle Citizen's Portal (https://www.newcastlelea.org/CitizenPortal_LIVE/en), and from local schools, or on request from the School Admissions Team. Application forms should be submitted to the LA by the published closing date. Places at any schools are offered on the basis of equal preference rank order and, where an offer is made, it is for the highest ranked school at which the LA can offer a place.

Parents/carers who are resident in one LA but wish to apply for a place at a school within

another LA must apply for a place through their home LA. LAs must share information on all applications made by residents for a place in another LA area.

Each preference will be considered and ranked against the oversubscription criteria of the school concerned, including any supplementary evidence where provided. This then creates a list of all children who have an application for the school, ranked in the order of priority under the school's admission arrangements.

Once all ranked lists are created, the LA will compare lists for all schools in its area. Where a child is eligible for a place at only one of the preferred schools, a place at that school will be offered to the child. Where the child is eligible for a place at two or more of the preferred schools, they will be offered a place at whichever school is the highest ranked on the application form. Where the LA cannot offer a place at any of the preferred schools, and the child will be without a school place in September 2027, the offer of a place will be made at a Newcastle school which has places available after all applications have been considered. Note that being eligible for a place means that their application is ranked in a position on the ranked list where a place is able to be offered. Only including one school preference, or fewer than four preferences, will not improve the likelihood of being eligible for a place in that school but will increase the risk of not being offered a place in any preferred school

All applications and offered of school places during the normal admission round must be coordinated by the LA.

Interpretation and glossary

In this Scheme -

"The LA" is Newcastle City Council acting in its capacity as a local (education) authority.

"The LA area" means Newcastle upon Tyne.

"School" means a community, voluntary controlled, foundation or voluntary-aided school (but not a special school) which is maintained by the LA.

"Academy" means a state-funded non-fee-paying independent school set up under a Funding Agreement between the Secretary of State and the proprietor of an Academy (most commonly and hereafter referred to as an Academy Trust). Academy Funding Agreements require them to comply with the Code and the law relating to admissions, though the Secretary of State has the power to vary this requirement where there is a demonstrable need. Academies include free schools and studio schools.

"Admission authority" in relation to a community or voluntary-controlled school means the LA and, in relation to a foundation or voluntary-aided school or an academy, means the governing body of that school.

"Suitable school" means the nearest available school which offers an efficient full-time programme of education appropriate to the individual child's age, ability, aptitude and any special educational needs, in the view of the LA.

"The specified year" is the school year beginning in September 2027.

"Admission arrangements" are the determined arrangements which govern the procedures and decision-making for the purpose of admitting pupils to a particular school or academy.

"Late application" means any application for a place in the first year of entry to the school that is received after the closing date for applications.

"Parent" means any parent or carer or person who (as defined in the 1989 Children Act) holds parental responsibility for a child and with whom the child normally lives.

"Home authority" is the LA that the parent resides in.

The Scheme

The scheme will apply to all first, primary, middle, secondary and high schools and academies in the LA area (except special schools, nursery schools and North East Futures UTC, see page 20). The scheme must be determined by 28 February 2026 and shall take effect from 1 September 2026.

Under the scheme, Newcastle City Council will set and apply the oversubscription criteria for all community schools in the area. The governing bodies of voluntary-aided and foundation schools are the admission authorities for these schools and will set and apply their own oversubscription criteria. Academy Trusts are the admission authorities for academies and will set and apply the oversubscription criteria. The LA will work with all other admission authorities within Newcastle and with other relevant local authorities to ensure that a fair and transparent system for the allocation of places is achieved.

The normal admissions round

The scheme will apply to all children whose parents are seeking a school place for the school's initial year of entry for the start of autumn term 2027 (whether or not it is their age cohort). The initial years of entry are:

School type or name	Initial year of entry
First and primary schools	Reception
Middle schools	Year 5
Secondary schools	Year 7
High schools	Year 9

There will be a common application form supplied by the LA for the purpose of enabling parents living in Newcastle to express up to four preferences for their child to be admitted to a school in Newcastle or to a school or schools in another LA area for the academic year 2027/28.

The common application form must be used as a means of expressing one or more preferences for the purposes of Section 86 of the School Standards and Framework Act

1998 by parents who are resident in the LA area wishing to express a preference for their child either to be admitted to a maintained school or Academy within the LA area, or to be admitted to a maintained school or Academy located within another LA area.

The common application form will invite the parent to express up to four preferences which can include schools outside the LA area, in the rank order in which they wish their child to receive an offer of a place. Parents can provide their reasons for each preference.

The common application form is available for all applicants; this will be available online via the Newcastle City Council website, and as a paper version. Online applications are positively encouraged.

The form will specify the closing date and how the form can be submitted or, in the case of paper applications, where the application form must be returned to. Completed applications must be returned to the LA before the closing date.

There is printed information available explaining the co-ordinated admissions scheme to parents. This explains that:

- i. the parent will receive one single offer of a school place
- ii. all preferences will be treated equally
- iii. a place will be offered at the highest ranked school for which the child is eligible for a place under the admission criteria
- iv. if more than one school could offer a place, the parent will be regarded as having ranked the schools in the preference order appearing on the form
- v. if a place is unable to be offered at a preferred school, a place will be offered at an alternative school.

The LA will take all reasonable steps to ensure that every parent who is resident in Newcastle upon Tyne and who has a child that is due to start primary education or is in their last year of first, primary or middle school is made aware of the procedures for applying for a school place and has access to the application form and supporting guidance. All relevant information is published on the City Council's website, along with a link to the on-line application. Paper forms can also be provided if necessary.

Verification of data

Parents may be asked to provide proof of address by the LA or by other admission authorities. Parents may also be asked to provide additional information to support any reasons for application, such as medical or social evidence, looked after or previously looked after children etc.

Supplementary information

Where an admission authority has requested parents to provide additional information or evidence to support the governing body to correctly apply its oversubscription criteria, parents are responsible for responding to this request in line with the deadlines set by the admission authority.

Testing

Where a selection or aptitude test of any kind is part of the school's admission arrangements, the admission authority must take all reasonable steps to inform parents of the outcome of selection tests before the closing date for secondary applications on 31 October so as to allow parents time to make an informed choice of school - while making clear that this does not equate to a guarantee of a selective place.

Submission dates

The application period for both reception and transfers will open from 1 September 2026. This is the date from which parents can apply online or request a paper form.

31 October 2026 11:59pm, is the deadline for parents to apply to the LA for a place in a middle, secondary or high school or academy.

15 January 2027 11:59pm, is the deadline for parents to apply to the LA for a place in a reception class.

It is the responsibility of parents or carers to ensure that applications are returned directly to the home LA by the closing date.

Late applications

Any application for the normal admissions round received after the deadline will be deemed "late". Late applications will be dealt with after all on-time applications have been processed and places allocated. Late applicants will not be made an offer on national offer day. They will be offered as part of the late offer process.

Only in exceptional limited circumstances will late applications be considered at the same time as applications submitted on time. These include:

- the illness/death of a close relative such that making an application during the application period was not possible.
- a move into Newcastle from outside the area after the deadline date but before the exceptional circumstances' deadline. Confirmation of the new address must be provided (in the form of evidence of completion of purchase or a tenancy agreement).
- where there has been a delay in the LA receiving the application due to a LA administrative error.

Documentary evidence should be provided with the application to verify the circumstances which caused the application to be late. If evidence cannot be provided, the application will not be considered as an exception. The LA will determine whether the late application is considered as an exception.

20 November 2026 is the deadline for asking for a late application for a place in a middle, secondary or high school or academy to be considered as an on-time exception.

29 January 2027 is the deadline for asking for a late application for a reception place to be considered as an on-time exception.

Changing preferences

No changes will be accepted to applications after the deadline date has passed, unless there is a genuine reason for the change, such as a change of address or siblings have changed schools. Such changes will only be accepted up to the exception deadline dates given above. If these are not met, the request will not be considered as an exception.

Evidence may be requested to support these changes before being accepted. Any accepted request to change preferences will cancel and replace the previous application. If submitted after the deadline date, and not agreed by the LA as an exception, this means the original application will be used for national offer day. The new application will be processed as late and will be considered as part of the late offer process.

No form received

Where no form is submitted, a school place will not be offered on National Offer Day.

Processing applications

After the closing date, the LA will forward details of relevant applications received on time to other admission authorities in its area and to other LAs if a preference is made for a school in another area.

Parental preferences will be ranked by every admission authority strictly according to the oversubscription criteria for the relevant school. The ranked lists will be returned to the LA by the specified date detailing how the oversubscription criteria have been applied to the list.

The order of school preference listed on the application form will not affect these rankings.

Determining offers

The LA will act as a clearing house for the allocation of places by the relevant admission authorities. The LA will only make a decision on the offer or refusal of a place in response to any preference expressed on the form where:

- i) it is acting in its separate capacity as an admission authority, or on behalf of another admission authority that has delegated its role to the LA, or
- ii) an applicant is eligible for a place at more than one school, or
- iii) an applicant is not eligible for a place at any school that the parent has nominated.

The LA, using preference data and oversubscription criteria rankings (including those from own admission authority schools and academies), will allocate places according to each parent's preference ranking as follows:

- where a parent's first preference can be met, a place will be allocated at that school. The LA will not consider any lower ranked preferences.
- where a parent's first preference cannot be met, but a lower preference can, a place will be allocated at the lower preference school. Any preferences ranked lower than the preference offered will not be considered.
- where none of the parent's preferences can be met, a place will be allocated at an alternative Newcastle school with places available, if there are places available.

Reception and Transfer Offers

On national offer day, the LA will write to all parents who have made a valid application through Newcastle, notifying them of:

- a. An offer of a place at one of the preferences on the application; or
- b. An offer of a place at an alternative suitable Newcastle school with places available; or
- c. A confirmation that no school is able to offer a place

A confirmation that no school is able to offer a place is generally only applicable if the child has a confirmed school place for September 2027 (for example, a child who is currently on roll at a primary school whose parents have applied for a middle school place). However, there are some occasions where a place cannot be offered on national offer day even though the child would not have a place in September. This happens rarely and is usually due to a parent not having utilised all school preferences and only including schools where their child is not ranked in a high enough priority category within the schools' oversubscription criteria. For example, where a transfer application does not include a preference for the named feeder school. Where a child does not have a school place for September, the Admissions Team will work with the parents to secure a place in a suitable school.

Where parents have applied online, they will also be informed that they can view and respond to their offer on the Citizen's Portal. Parents who have provided an email address will be sent an email with offer information, and parents who have not supplied an email address, or who have not provided a valid email address will be sent a hard copy letter in the post. Offer information will not be shared over the telephone.

The LA's communication will advise parents to respond to their application within two weeks of national offer day. It will also advise parents to confirm in writing if they wish to be added to waiting lists for higher preference schools which they have not been offered.

The LA's communication will also inform parents of their right to appeal for a place at any school which has refused a place (not schools which were ranked below the offered school on the parent's application).

This communication will also include the admissions category that their child was ranked within.

Details of how places were allocated at each school will be published on the Newcastle City Council website on national offer day.

Responding to offers

Parents are required to respond to the LA regarding the offer of a school place to either accept or refuse it within two weeks of national offer day. If the parent does not confirm to the LA that they accept the place, the LA may remove the place and reallocate it to another child.

Parents should not refuse a place unless they are certain of a place at an alternative school. This does not remove the parent's right of appeal for schools refused by the LA.

If a parent wishes their child to be considered for an alternative school(s) after offer day, a new application must be completed listing the new order of preferences. This will cancel out and replace the previous application. Parents are only allowed a maximum of four active preferences in any local authority at one time.

Waiting Lists

If a parent wishes their child to be placed on a waiting list, they must request this in writing to the local authority's School Admissions Team. If a parent has requested their child is added to a waiting list, that child will be kept on the waiting list, as long as it is a higher preference to the school which they were offered. For example, where a parent has been allocated a place at their second preference school, they may request to be placed on the waiting list of their first preference school but not their third.

Where a parent has been offered a place at a school that they did not express a preference for, they may request their child be placed on the waiting list of all their preferred schools and considered for places at those schools if any become available. In these circumstances, the LA will write to parents to confirm whether they wish to be placed on the waiting lists for their preferred schools.

In all cases, **parents must request to be added to any waiting list.**

Waiting lists will be kept by all admission authorities until at least **31 December 2027**. The waiting list will be maintained strictly in accordance with the oversubscription criteria and if a place becomes available this will be offered to the child ranked highest on the list. Places on waiting lists will change over time as new applications are received.

When any place in a school is refused by a parent, the LA will reallocate that place to the child at the top of the waiting list for that school. If the child who is top of the waiting list currently holds an offer of another school, this will be removed without further correspondence with the parent.

There will be two waiting list phases when available places will be reallocated after national offer day:

- i) the late offer process will reallocate places that have become available since national offer day. Late applications and late changes to preferences are included at this stage.

- ii) Following the late offer process, available places will be re-allocated regularly.

The LA will regularly send communication via email or post to parents whose child is on the waiting list for one or more schools. This correspondence will remind them which schools their child is on a waiting list for, and that their current offer will be removed if a place becomes available in the waiting list processes.

Parents can request that their child is removed from waiting lists at any time and **must** let the LA know if they no longer wish their child to remain on a waiting list.

The only legal offers up until 31 August 2027 will be from the LA. From 1 September 2027, offers will be made directly by schools or via the local authority if the school buys into their SLA (service level agreement).

Appeals

All parents have the right of appeal if refused a place at a school. Appeals are Co-ordinated by the relevant admission authority. Appeals will be heard by an independent appeals panel and, if the panel uphold the appeal, the decision is legally binding on the admission authority and they must admit the child. All schools must publish details of how to make an appeal, alongside their admissions policy.

Applying for a year outside the child's age group

A child reaches compulsory school age on the prescribed day following their fifth birthday (or their fifth birthday if it falls on a prescribed day). The prescribed days are 31 December, 31 March and 31 August. A child is entitled to a full-time school place in the September following their fourth birthday.

There is flexibility for parents who do not feel their child is ready to start school before they reach compulsory school age. They may defer the date their child is admitted to school until later in the school year following their child's fourth birthday, providing they do not defer beyond the point at which they reach compulsory school age, or beyond the start of the final term of that school year. Alternatively, their child may attend school part-time until they reach compulsory school age. This is a statutory right.

Children born in the summer term (1 April to 31 August), are not required to start school until the September after their fifth birthday, a year after they could first have been admitted.

The LA expects children to attend school within their relevant age group. Where a parent would like to delay admission to reception by a whole school year this will be considered by the appropriate admission authority. Any admission authority will expect parents to provide them with information in support of their request. This should demonstrate why it would be in the child's best interests to be admitted to reception rather than year one. Professional evidence is appropriate, such as advice from a speech and language therapist however admission authorities may not refuse to consider requests which do not include professional evidence. For children with special educational needs, there can be unintended consequences of delaying by a full year and appropriate advice should be sought from the

SEND Team at the LA. Further information can be found on the City Council's website.

Where a parent wants their child to be admitted out of their normal age group, the admission authority has two separate decisions to make:

- It must first decide on the age group the child should be admitted to
- Only once this decision has been made can it apply its oversubscription criteria to decide whether a place can be offered in that age group.

Any request to transfer to middle, secondary or high school a year early or late would also be considered and decided at the discretion of the admission authority. The LA expects requests for students who have previously been taught out of year group to be upheld by the admitting admission authority, unless there are significant reasons why it would be in the child's best interests for the request to be refused.

Any agreed request will be included, along with all other applications for a school place at a particular school, in the process of determining the allocation of places.

The LA will provide a form for parents to complete when they have requested that a child is taught outside their normal year group. This information will form part of the decision making by the admissions authority, following their procedures and national guidance. The views of the Headteacher of the school will be taken into account during this process.

Process in place:

- Parents are encouraged to submit a request for an offset in good time to allow admission authorities to consider the application prior to the deadline for applications for the relevant year.
- This ensures parents can decide whether to submit an on-time application for the child's normal age group, or for the offset year group.
- The School Admissions Team will log and share the request with the admission authorities of the schools named on the request.
- The admission authority will consider the request and respond to the parent.
- If agreed, the parent must make a new application for the following year.
- Only one application can be considered – the current year or following year. Parents are not able to apply for the same school in two reception rounds unless the offset is agreed after an offer has been made for the current year.
- One admission authority cannot be required to honour a decision made by another admission authority on admission out of the normal age group.
- Once a child has been admitted to a school it is for the headteacher to decide how best to educate them. In some cases, it may be appropriate for a child who has been admitted out of their normal year group to be moved back into their normal age group at some point, but in others it will not. Any decision to move a child to a different age group will be based on sound educational reasons and made by the headteacher in consultation with the parents.
- Where a child has been educated out of their normal age group, the parent will need to request admission out of the normal year group when they transfer to middle/high or

secondary schools. This also includes via in-year transfers. It will be for the admission authority of that school to decide whether to admit the child out of their normal year group. The admission authority will make a decision based on the circumstances of each case and in the child's best interests and will bear in mind the age group the child has been educated in up to that point.

- For children with an EHCP, the local authority must also agree to the offset in their review process. Where children are subsequently allocated special schools through this process, they will generally return to their normal year group.
- Having an agreement from a school to accept an application for a year group outside of the child's normal year group does not guarantee a place will be offered in that school. All applications will be ranked strictly according to the oversubscription criteria for the relevant school.

Shared responsibility

Where two adults have shared parental responsibility for a child, they should agree before submitting the application which schools to name as their preferred schools. Where conflicting applications are received, or the Admissions Team is made aware of a dispute between parents, all applications will be placed on hold and will not be processed until:

- i) one joint application is made, or
- ii) written agreement is provided from both parents, or
- iii) a Court Order is obtained confirming which parent's application carries precedence.

Children of UK service personnel and Crown Servants

The LA will allocate a place in advance for families of UK service personnel and Crown Servants with a confirmed posting to the area, where they are moving to the area outside of the normal admission round.

Distance measurements

Distances are measured in a straight-line distance from a single fixed central point at the school to a point in the centre of the home address of the child, using the Local Land and Property Gazetteer and British National Grid Easting and Northing co-ordinates.

Applying for places outside of the normal transfer times – in-year applications

Schools must provide the LA with vacancy information within two days of this being requested. The LA will publish vacancy information provided by schools on the Newcastle City Council website.

The LA will provide parents with additional information on the process for in-year applications, timescales and schools near to their home or moving address which have places available.

Parents applying for a place for their child(ren) in a Newcastle school will need to complete the LA's In-Year application form for each child and return it to the Admissions Team.

Parents can name up to four preferred schools on the form. Applications for children who are not currently in a mainstream Newcastle school can also be made on the Newcastle Citizen's Portal.

Applications will be accepted from parents a maximum of 20 school days prior to the admission requested date. For applications made for September in the following academic year, applications will be accepted from the last week in June. The exception to this will be for returning crown servant or active service family applications where applications can be completed up to a half-term in advance of the place being required.

Places cannot be allocated on the basis of intended future changes of address unless house moves have been confirmed, for example through the completion of purchase or the signing of a formal lease agreement. Documentary evidence to support the new address may be required.

Applications to move schools within Newcastle mainstream schools must be completed on a "Moving schools within Newcastle" application form. This form requires additional information from headteachers regarding support required to enable a successful transition into a new school.

In Newcastle, most schools manage their own in-year admissions directly. The LA will forward the application on to the school and the school will inform the parent if they are able to offer a place.

The LA will track applications made to schools and supply schools with a regular list of applications which need to be responded to. Schools are responsible for ensuring responses to applications are made within the statutory deadlines.

The child is expected to take up the offer and attend the allocated school within 10 school days of being made an offer, or the offer may be withdrawn.

The LA will monitor in-year applications and intervene as appropriate to ensure children in Newcastle are placed in a school without undue delay. This may include:

- Encouraging parents to apply for alternative schools with places available
- If no places are available with a reasonable distance (and other criteria), progressing through the Fair Access Protocol
