## 2016 Proposal

Government cuts, heavily skewed against Newcastle and the North East, are having a damaging impact on our capacity to deliver public services and support the economy of the city. In addition, we continue to face unavoidable rising costs. By 2016, we will need to reduce the amount we spend by over £90m. This equates to a third of our current budget. The savings are unprecedented and are the most challenging the city has ever faced.

These savings cannot be made by just being more efficient. It means we will need to look at every service and decide what will be provided in the future and how. These difficult decisions will be made by applying a fairness test to every decision, analysing future needs and taking into account the views of the public expressed through the Let's talk Newcastle programme.

### **The Approach**

Local Services – Services People Access considers three significant front line services:

- Libraries and Cultural Services
- Council Leisure Services (pools and leisure centres)
- Council Customer Service Centres

These could be to remove or reduce the services on offer or to change the way they are delivered. Due to our budget position, we have been asked to work with a new budget of £8,870,000 (compared with an existing budget of £16.885,000). The only way to operate within this new budget is to radically re-engineer services, and also reduce the level of service provided across the city.

### **Delivering the current service and cost**

Newcastle Library service currently provides a network of 17 community libraries and the City Library as well as a Home Delivery Service which is predominantly staffed by volunteers from NCVS.

Local authorities are required to provide a comprehensive and efficient service under the Public Libraries and Museums Act 1964. This requires the service to provide the public with free access to books and other materials. Newcastle City library currently provides access to a wide selection of books and information, free access to computers, as well as a range of activities available to the public such as reading groups, Job Clubs, IT taster sessions and homework clubs.

The Library service currently costs £4,021,667 to run, 61% of which is consumed by the cost of running City Library.

| 1.2 | <b>The Proposal</b>   |
|     | <p>This IIA assess the impact of closing 10 libraries across the city. These libraries are Blakelaw, Cruddas Park, Denton Burn, Dinnington, Fawdon, Fenham, High Heaton, Jesmond, Moorside and Newbiggin Hall Libraries. Walker and Newburn Libraries will move out of their current facilities and into the Walker Activity Dome and Newburn Surestart Centre respectively. The East End Customer Service Centre will move into the space currently occupied by East End Library, this will lead to reduced space in the library for stock as well as reducing the amount of space available for the Customer Service Centre to deal with enquiries.</p> <p>The high quality City Library, located off Northumberland Street, will be the hub for the new service. Libraries will be retained in the East End, West End, Outer West, Kenton, Newburn, Walker and Gosforth, combined with other services.</p> <p>We propose to close the libraries in Dinnington, Moorside, Cruddas Park, High Heaton, Denton Burn, Jesmond and Fenham in June 2013. Blakelaw, Newbiggin Hall, and Fawdon Libraries are currently linked to a community centre, and we will delay closure until March 2015 in order to support those centres through this transition.</p> <p>Even after these closures, 96% of Newcastle residents would still live within 1½ miles of a library. But we recognise that there will be many residents for whom this would represent a significant loss. We remain open to cost effective solutions proposed by the communities affected. For example, we would want to consider proposals for self-service and unstaffed library borrowing and digital facilities in other buildings, or services run by volunteers; including community centres, Sure Start Children’s Centres and schools.</p> <p>The proposal to close these community libraries has been driven by the need to meet budget requirements. These closures will take place over a three year period and will involve the reduction of staffing levels across the service as well as reducing management levels and a reduction of spend on new stock. The libraries remaining as part of the core network have been chosen to provide strategic sites across the city ensuring that 96% of residents are not more than 1.5 miles from a library.</p> <p>The service will continue to provide access to books, periodicals, local history and information as part of its core service across eight sites but will also continue to develop its digital offer to support people to access the library service from their own homes. The Library service will continue to provide access to computers and access to the People’s Network will remain free of charge. This will also to help support the city in its bid to become a “Super Connected” City by providing a community ‘safety net’ for our Digital by Default ambitions.</p> <p>The service will continue its volunteer led Home Delivery Service which will offer disabled and elderly users the opportunity to have stock delivered to their homes to if they are unable to attend their local library. This service will also be able to offer an at home service to people who are unable to travel (due to mobility issues) to one of the core libraries.</p> <p>The service is currently looking at other facilities in the city in which we currently deliver services such as Sure Start Centres and community buildings to see if they could help</p> |

provide space for community run library facilities.

The proposal to close Blakelaw, Cruddas Park, Denton Burn, Dinnington, Fawdon, Fenham, High Heaton, Jesmond, Moorside and Newbiggin Hall Libraries will save £641,000 a year and will involve the reduction of 20.5 fte members of staff.

These Libraries received over 350,000 visitors in the last year, issuing nearly quarter of a million items and registered over 2,000 new users.

Due to the financial pressures we face **these proposals deliver the most efficient and comprehensive service affordable and are likely to meet the government's definition of 'comprehensive and efficient'**. The service will continue to deliver a service which helps to meet our four priorities: A Working City, Tackling Inequalities, Decent Neighbourhoods and a Fit for Purpose organisation through a range of delivery methods including eight branch libraries, an extensive digital offer and through outreach work which will be performed in the community.

We are legally required to set a one-year budget only. The figures for 2014/15 and 2015/16 should be regarded as indicative at this stage. Firmer figures for 2014/15 and 2015/16 will be published in November 2013 and November 2014 respectively.

**1.3 Ward /geographical impact**

Libraries are based across the city and their closures are likely to affect people from all wards.

**Blakelaw**  
Residents in Blakelaw ward live between one and two miles from the Outer West Library. There is a regular bus route between Blakelaw and the Outer West Library.

**Cruddas Park**  
Cruddas Park library is approximately one mile from the West End Library. There is a regular bus route between Elswick and Adelaide Terrace, close to the West End Library.

**Denton Burn**

Denton Burn library is less than one mile from Outer West Library. There is no regular bus route between Denton Burn and the Outer West Library. There is a regular bus route between Denton Burn and the City Library.

**Dinnington**

Dinnington Library is more than two miles from the nearest libraries in Kenton and Gosforth. There is a regular bus route between Dinnington and the Regent Centre, close to the Gosforth Library.

**Fawdon**

Fawdon Library is approximately one mile from both Gosforth and Kenton Libraries. There is a Metro line between Fawdon and the Regent Centre, close to the Gosforth Library.

**Fenham**

Fenham Library is less than one mile from West End Library. There is a regular buss route between Fenham and Adelaide Terrace, close to the West End Library.

**High Heaton Library**

High Heaton Library is approximately one mile from the East End Library and the miles from the City Library. There is a regular bus route between High Heaton and the East End Library and also between High Heaton and the City Library.

**Jesmond**

Jesmond Library is just over one mile from the City Library. There is a Metro line between West Jesmond and the city centre.

**Moorside**

Moorside Library is approximately one mile from City Library. There is a regular bus route between Moorside Library and the City Library.

**Newbiggin Hall**

Residents in Newbiggin Hall live between one and two miles from the Outer West Library. There is a regular bus route between Newbiggin Hall and the Outer West Library.

**Newburn**

Residents in Newburn live between one and two miles from the Outer West Library. There is no regular bus route between Newburn and the Outer West Library. There is a regular bus route between Newburn and the City Library.

**Walker**

Walker Library is approximately one mile from the East End Library. There is a regular bus route between Walker and the East End Library.
